



Homeownership Provides Stability

Carliiss Green celebrated a milestone in May shared by families across Cincinnati -- a graduation party. But her joy was doubled because both her daughters were graduating. Her oldest daughter Marie graduated from the University of Cincinnati (UC) with a degree in Social Work and her daughter Shawna graduated Valedictorian from Horizon Science Academy. Both girls are continuing their education. Marie is at the Masters program for Social Work at UC and Shawna is at Indiana Tech working on a degree as a Therapeutic Recreational Specialist. Carliiss' son, Tevin, is in 10th grade at Hope Academy.

When Carliiss bought her Habitat home in 2005, she was a recovering addict who had been sober for 7.5 years. But her addiction took its toll on her, her family and their lives. Carliiss had no diploma, three children and was battling addiction. During this time, her kids would live with relatives and

be placed in foster care while Carliiss entered treatment. It would then take Carliiss a year to earn her diploma, get a job and start rebuilding a new life with her kids.

Carliiss said, "I had to do different this time. I knew nothing would improve until I got grounded, looked at my character defects and got those changed. It was such a growing process for me. My family was skeptical, but I knew they had faith in me and I had to prove myself it was deserved. Being in treatment, I learned to own my mistakes and apologize for transgressions."

Cincinnati Habitat provided Carliiss the opportunity to prove that goals can be made into reality. Carliiss said, "I kept telling my kids that we would own our own home and not be stuck in these horrible apartments and projects, but why would they believe that? Habitat made that dream a reality. At the end of the day, we have a home to go

home to. I can't find the words to describe what strength and courage that gave me and, in turn, my kids."

The Green family's story exemplifies what statistics prove. Studies show that children of homeowners are 25% more likely to graduate from high school and 116% more likely to graduate from college -- accomplishments that both of Carliiss' daughters achieved and which her son is well on his way of reaching.

Home ownership has provided a means for Carliiss to stabilize life for herself and her children. It truly has been a hand up -- and not a hand out -- for her family. Carliiss probably put it best when she said: "We live in a home that is proof that anything is possible and it has given me the courage to ask, 'Ok Lord, what is next? I am ready for the next accomplishment!'"

Summer is upon us and that means the building season is at full throttle. Cincinnati Habitat continues to grow and is undertaking 9 new construction builds and 7 rehabs in 2011. Sixteen more families will have a decent, affordable home thanks to our sponsors and volunteers. It is an exciting time as this is the most rehab projects that we have ever tackled in a single year. And, we are still focused on energy efficiency, striving for Energy Star Plus certification on the new builds and LEED certification on one new build (Mohawk St.) and 2 rehabs (Elm St.). Plans are progressing on 18 projects in 2012. We are committed, even in this tough economy, to continue to increase the number of families served each year.

Faith is the most important component in our growth plans. I can tell you we do not know for sure how we will fund 16 houses this year and 18 next year. But our faith and abundance mentality keeps us pushing forward. God has blessed Cincinnati Habitat for Humanity and we are committed to making it work. I am reminded of the loaves and fishes parable in the Gospel. Jesus assured his disciples that they could feed the masses with 5 loaves and 2 fish and they did! We are determined to utilize the gifts God has provided to Cincinnati Habitat through you and leverage it as far as it will go to reach more families in need of decent, affordable housing.

So what will you build this summer? I invite you to join us in building decent, affordable housing for 16 families this year and 18 families in 2012. Your tax deductible donations will combine with others and multiply the impact. Your contribution will be leveraged like never before to complete the 2011 builds and position the 2012 builds for success. Individual giving to Cincinnati Habitat for Humanity has declined each year since 2008 and this mirrors the national individual charitable giving trends of our slow economy.
